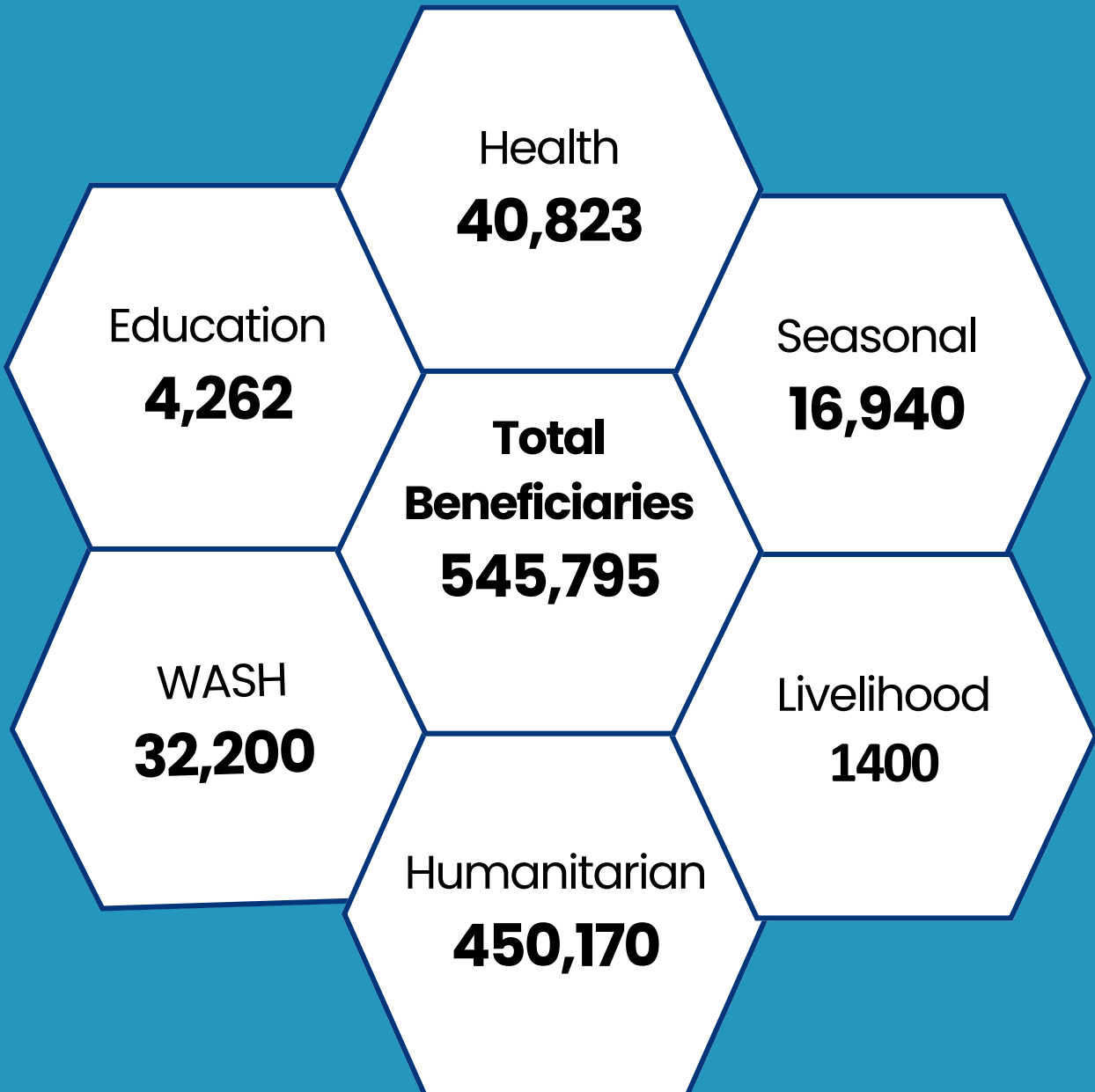

Our Humanitarian projects, spanning emergency health and nutrition, Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH),

Food Security and Livelihoods, as well as Shelter and Non-Food Items (NFIs), extended support to 450,170 marginalized and vulnerable families across 27 severely flood-affected districts in Punjab, Sindh, and Balochistan. INTRODUCTION

RAHMA Islamic Relief (RIR) was officially established on August 31, 2009, as a non-profit, non-governmental organization operating under the Trust Act of 1882, governed by the Government of Pakistan (GoP), with Registration No. 1629. The organization has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Economic Affairs Division (EAD) of the GoP. RIR has earned certification from the Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP) for meeting quality standards in internal governance, financial management, and program delivery.

Additionally, RIR is a member of various global forums such as the Stop TB Partnership and the Union of NGOs of the Islamic World (UNIW). Its healthcare program in Punjab is registered with the Punjab Healthcare Commission, GoP, under Registration No. R-32277.

RIR is guided by Islamic principles of charity and is dedicated to enhancing the lives of individuals regardless of their gender, caste, color, religion, or political affiliations.

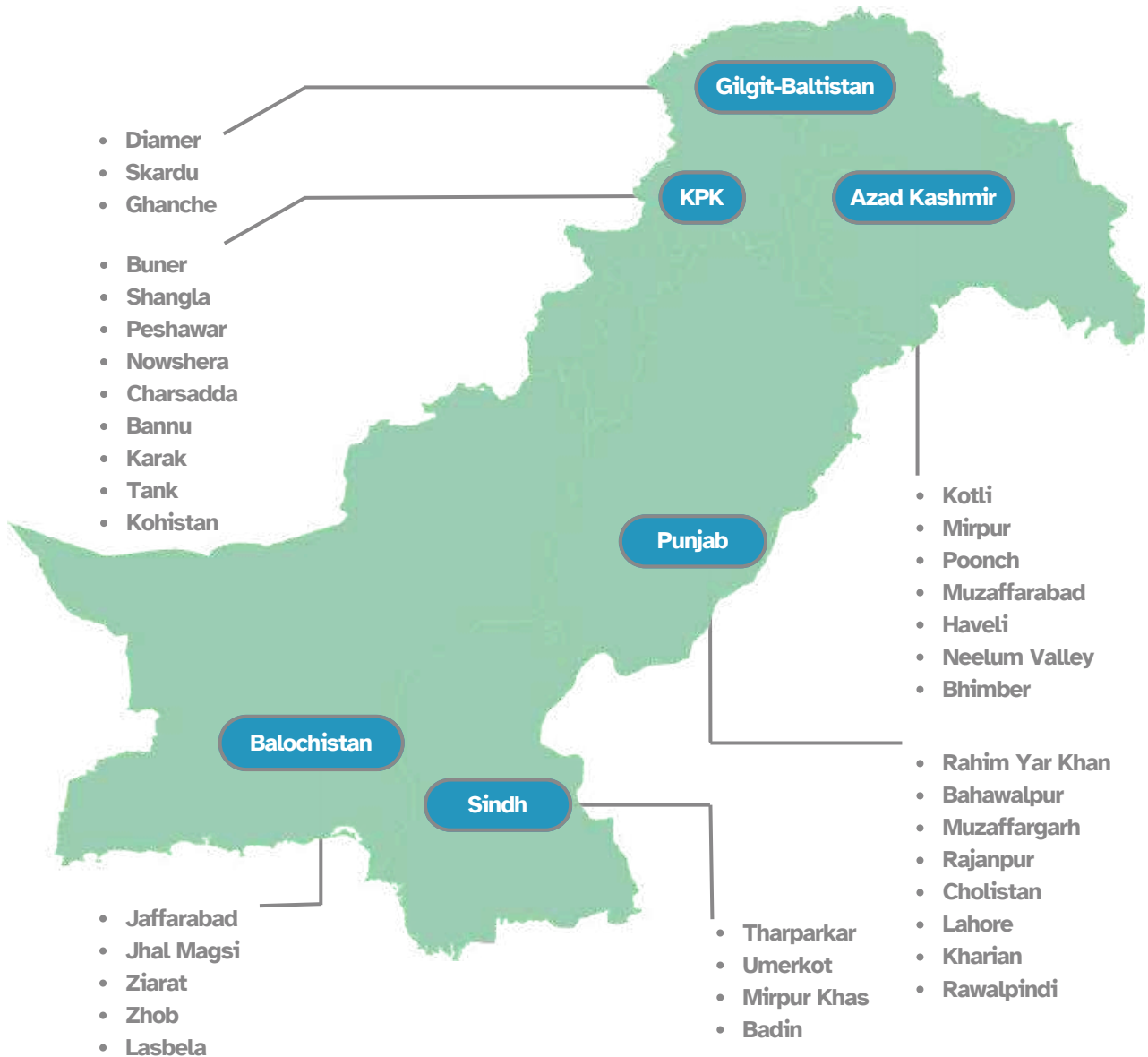

HEALTH

Access to healthcare (prevention and cure) remains a challenge in Pakistan. The burden of noncommunicable diseases alone is responsible for 50.5% of all deaths in the country. Women and children suffer more due to the dearth of quality healthcare services especially in remote rural areas. Many women die from preventable complications during pregnancy & delivery, and newborn care is unavailable in many parts of the country. RIR strives to increase access to the quality and timely healthcare services of the demographically remote and economically challenged communities, through:

- ▶ **Outpatient Consultation & Diagnostic Services**
- ▶ **Maternal, Newborn & Child Health Services**
- ▶ **Ambulance Services**
- ▶ **Addressing Malnutrition**
- ▶ **Health coverage for marginalized, women, the elderly and PWDs**

These services are provided through two regional Healthcare Centers named “RAHMA Hospitals”. RAHMA Hospital Janpur, Rahim Yar Khan and RAHMA Hospital Khuiratta, Kotli, AJK.

RAHMA HOSPITAL JANPUR (RHJ)

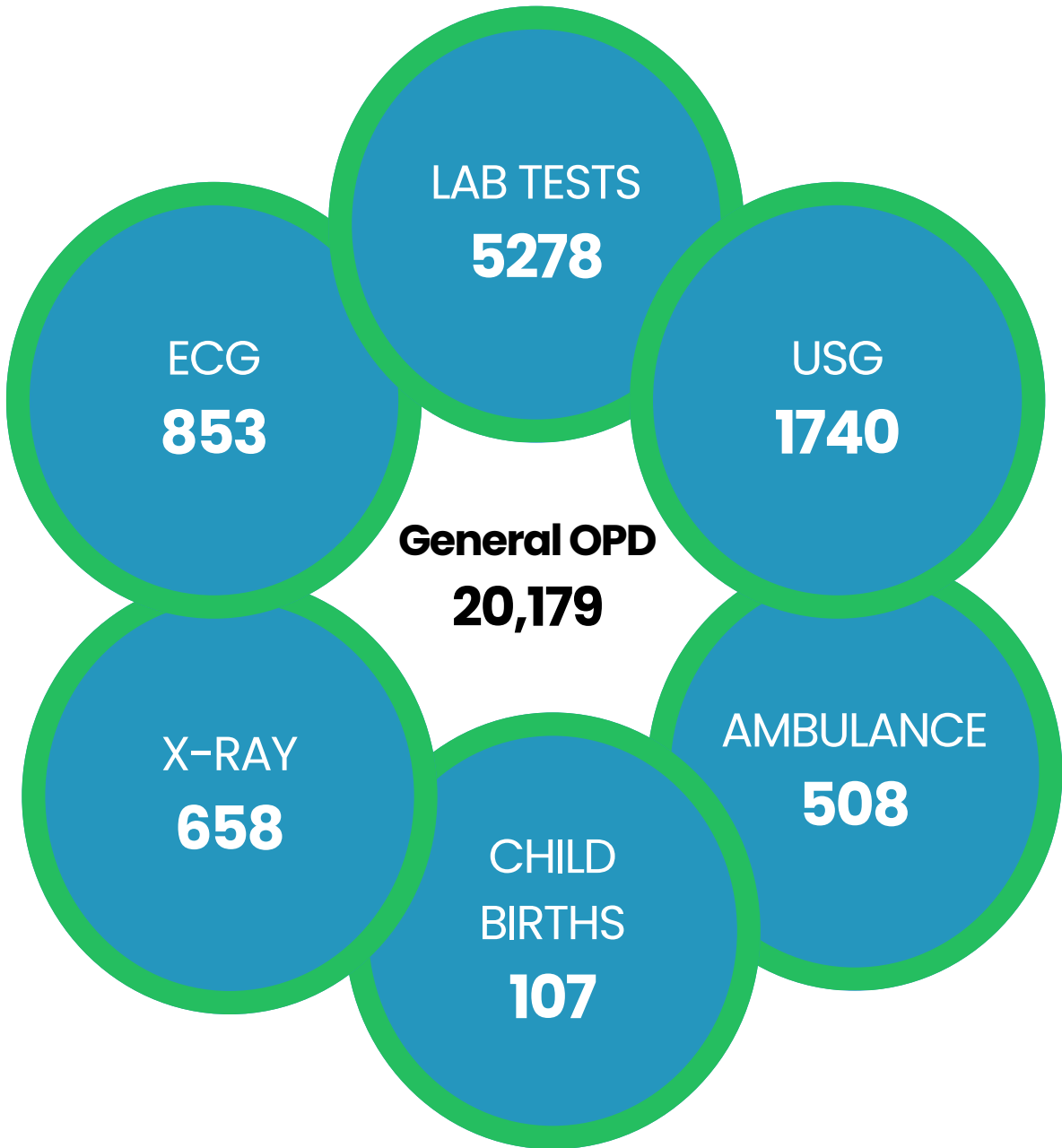
RAHMA Hospital Janpur was established in 2014 with the aim of providing accessible semi-tertiary healthcare services to the local community. Since its establishment, the hospital has been catering to approximately one million individuals across 14 Union Councils of Tehsil Liaquatpur.

RHJ- Contribution in Flood Relief

RAHMA Hospital Janpur actively joined hands in flood relief efforts, aligning with the organization's relief initiatives.

They swiftly organized medical camps across various Union Councils in flood-affected Rajanpur and other parts of South Punjab, addressing urgent health needs. These camps didn't just offer medical assistance but also focused on preventive care to tackle prevalent conditions like diarrhea, malaria, and potential epidemics in disaster-hit zones.

Furthermore, the hospital team took the chance to educate local communities on a range of health issues, empowering them with knowledge to navigate through their current challenges. Patients with diverse ailments, including skin diseases, diarrheal illnesses, malnutrition, malaria, fever, joint diseases, high blood pressure, and diabetes, were attended to during these camps.

In total, 1218 flood victims received vital care and support through these initiatives alone in Rajanpur, one of the worst flood affected district.

The exclusive medical camps tailored for malnourished children and women have proven immensely beneficial, reaching out to over 800 individuals in need.



RAHMA HOSPITAL KHUIRATTA

Kotli (AJK)

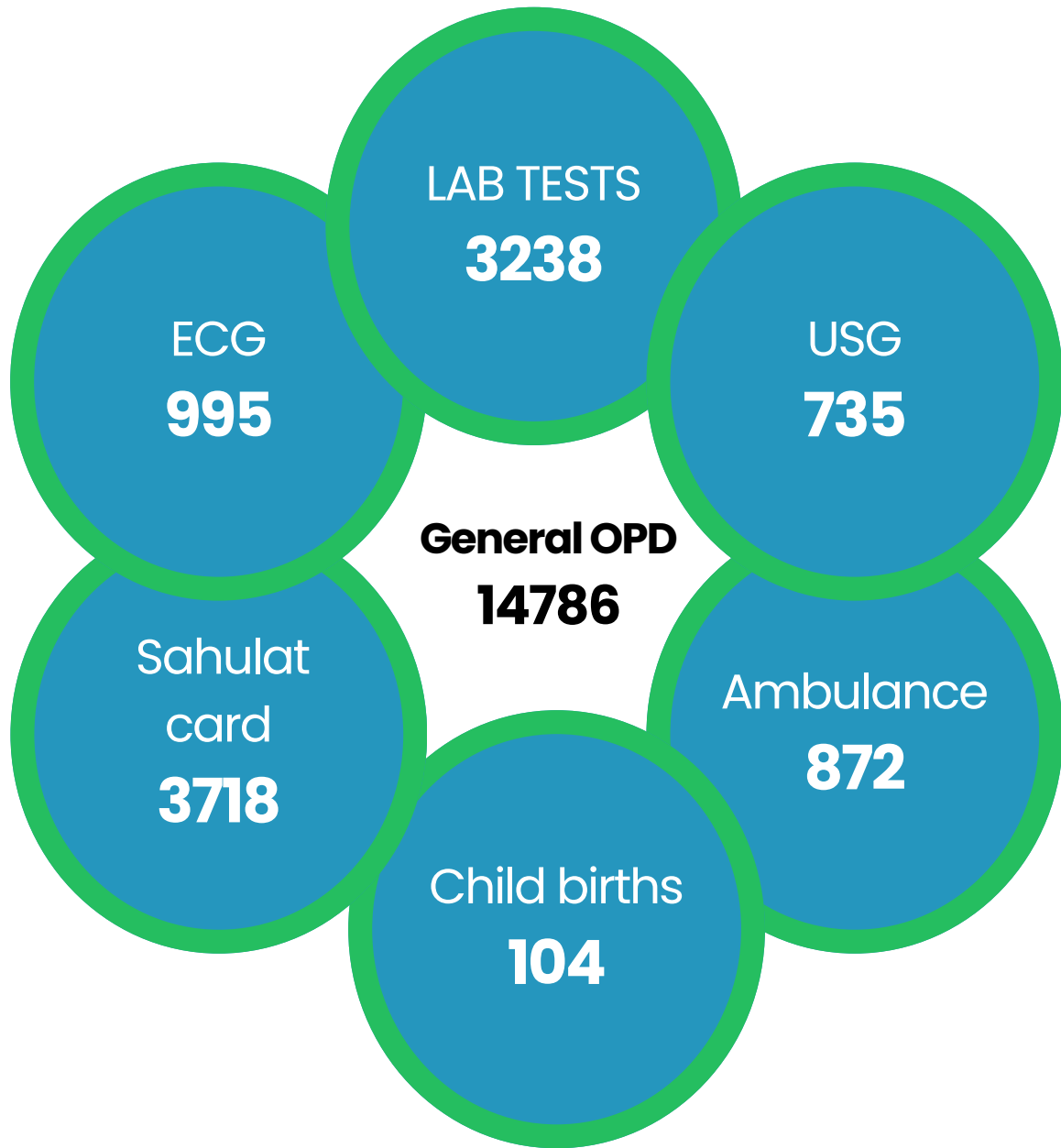
RAHMA Hospital Khuiratta has operated as a semi-tertiary hospital since 2009-10, offering free and heavily subsidized healthcare services to the underprivileged community of Khuiratta. Catering to an estimated population of 160,000 across five Union Councils in Tehsil Khuiratta, Kotli, Azad Kashmir, the hospital has been a lifeline for those in need.

Other Highlights

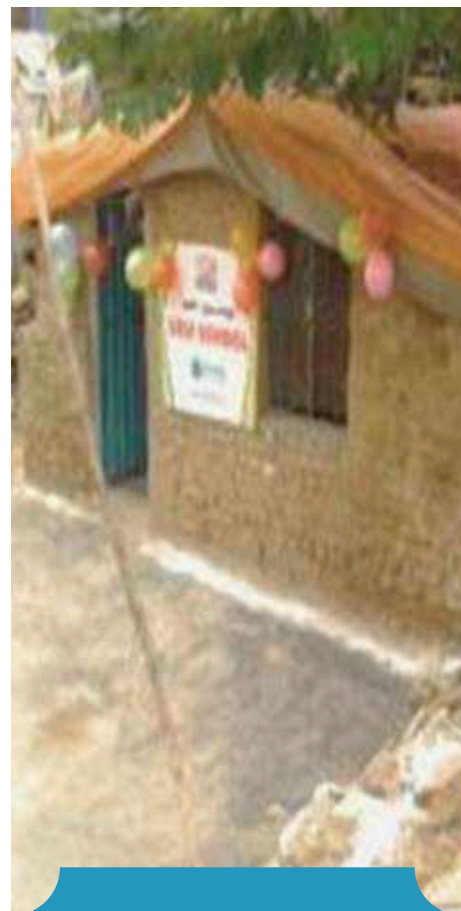
- Community-level awareness sessions on child and maternal health and nutrition, conducted by a gynaecologist in collaboration with Lady Health Workers, positively impacted 570 women and children under the age of five.
- Community-level free medical camps, which included examinations, screening for diseases such as diabetes and heart health, and the provision of free medicines, proved beneficial to over 700 individuals, including men, women, the elderly, and children.
- On November 24th, in observance of World Diabetes Day, the medical staff organized a day-long session aimed at raising awareness about the disease, its prevention, and management to mitigate health complications. Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials were distributed, along with screening tests, and free medicines including insulin, benefiting 170 women and men.





EDUCATION

Primary education coverage is on the rise in Pakistan; however, challenges with access still persist. According to government statistics, an estimated 22.6 million children aged 5-16 remain out of school, constituting 44% of all children in this age bracket. Pakistan ranks second in South Asia for having the highest number of Out-Of-School Children (OOSC) at the primary level, with over half of them being girls. A significant portion of these OOSC comes from the poorest, marginalized, and socially excluded groups residing in makeshift tarpaulin huts in slums. In Rawalpindi/Islamabad alone, approximately 15,000 children from such backgrounds are not enrolled in schools. In response, RAHMA began offering education to these children in 2012. Initially, a school was established within a slum near Rawalpindi Railway station, housed in a small hut. Subsequently, RAHMA successfully built the first-ever school dedicated exclusively to these marginalized children. Known as the 'RAHMA Model School', it has been providing education to marginalized children since April 2019.

RAHMA Model School (Rawat) Rawalpindi Campus

The construction of the RAHMA Model School building was finalized and inaugurated in April 2019. In its fourth year of operation, both class offerings and admissions experienced growth. Initially, the school offered classes ranging from Play Group to Class III with an intake of 50-60 students. Over the subsequent years, the school expanded its curriculum to include classes up to Class V, accommodating a total of 124 enrolled children, comprising 60 girls and 64 boys.



RAHMA Model School (Ashiq Abad) RYK Campus

The RAHMA Model School Ashiq Abad Campus comprises two structures: one designated for academic purposes and the other serving as a residential block for staff members.

The combined covered area of the complex is approximately 9,000 square feet. Moreover, approximately 6,200 square meters of land are left open for playgrounds, parking facilities, and potential future expansions of the buildings.

In the current academic session, the total enrollment at the school stands at 138 students, including 46 individuals who are unable to afford even a nominal fee and are receiving education free of charge.

WASH

According to reliable reports, 16 million people in Pakistan lack access to clean drinking water, while 68 million lack adequate sanitation facilities. The objective is to provide pure and clean drinking water to these underserved individuals who currently rely on impure water sources and reside far from accessible water supplies. They often endure significant travel and expenses to obtain water for their households.

For years, RAHMA has been working to make clean drinking water accessible to those in need, thereby reducing their vulnerability to water-borne diseases. During the reporting period, the organization established 46 safe water points in flood-affected districts, including Districts Umer Kot, Mirpur Khas, and Tharparkar in Sindh Province. Through its regular WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) development program, the organization has positively impacted 4,600 households (approximately 32,200 individuals).

HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE

Since June 2022, Pakistan has faced an unparalleled disaster due to heavy rains and flash flooding. This calamity has resulted in casualties exceeding two thousand people, the loss of millions of livestock, and widespread damage to both public and private infrastructure throughout the country. Landslides and floods have also inflicted significant harm on agricultural land and forests, exacerbating climate-related risks.

The Government of Pakistan has declared 84 districts nationwide as 'calamity hit', with the majority located in Balochistan (32 districts), Sindh (23 districts), and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (17 districts).

1. Reconstruction of houses

Over 2 million houses have been impacted by the recent events, with more than 897,014 houses completely destroyed and nearly 1.3 million houses sustaining damage. The majority of this devastation, amounting to eighty-nine percent, occurred in Sindh and Baluchistan, where over 683,000 houses were destroyed and over 1.1 million houses were damaged.

RAHMA has undertaken an initiative to reconstruct 100 houses (one room and two rooms) for the most marginalized families in Rajanpur (Punjab) and Jafferabad (Balochistan). The objective is to assist flood-affected individuals who have lost their homes by providing them with resilient, climate-change-resistant housing solutions.

2. Rehabilitation of Schools

The floods of 2022 had a significant impact on education, posing a threat to more than 12 million school-aged children, with 46% being girls, across 84 districts designated as calamity-hit. This exacerbated an already critical learning crisis. According to preliminary data from provincial Education Departments, at least 25,187 schools suffered damage or destruction due to the heavy rains and floods.

District Rajanpur in Punjab was severely affected by the floods. RAHMA Islamic Relief conducted assessments and identified 18 government schools in need of repairs and renovation in the district. The objectives were to restore functionality to these 18 government schools, which had been damaged by the flood, and to provide essential educational supplies and facilities. This included furnishing such as chairs and desks, whiteboards, educational kits, recreational and sports equipment, as well as support for library corners and computer labs based on the specific needs of each school.

This four months duration project benefitted 4000 flood affected students in district Rajanpur. Students were provided flour bags and hot meal too

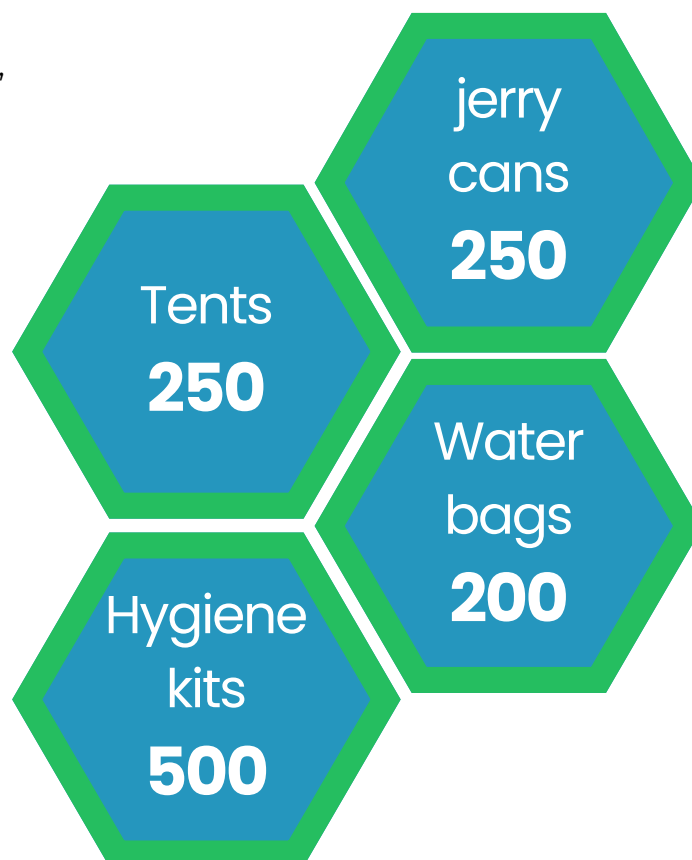

3. Shelter and Non Food Items

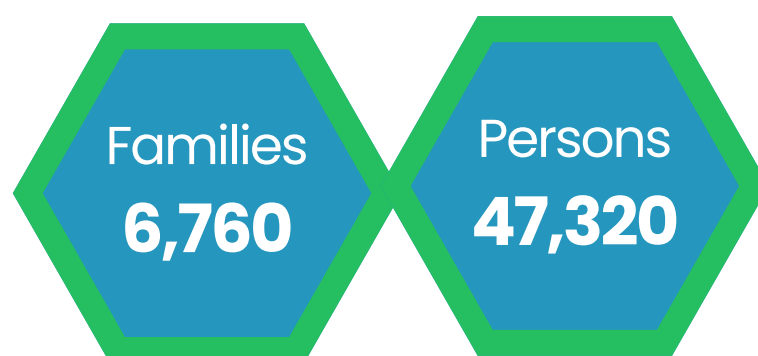
A. Sindh

In Mirpur Khas, a severely flood-affected district in Sindh, 250 households (comprising 1,750 individuals) received rainproof family ridge tents. Additionally, they were provided with jerry cans for safe water storage, along with the provision of 200 solar water treatment bags (one bag per household). Furthermore, 500 adolescent girls and women were given personal hygiene kits. Adult women and girls underwent training on safe hygiene practices, including the treatment of contaminated water at home using the provided solar water treatment bags.

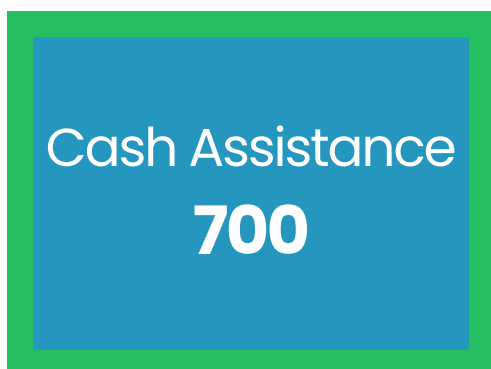
NFIs including winter kits benefited 6760 families in Taunsa Sharif, Nowshehra, Gilgit,(Ganchi) and Umerkot.



4. Food Security, Livelihoods & Multi-Purpose Cash Assistance ((MPCA)

The organization extended its support to 27 districts severely affected by calamities across all provinces, including Rajanpur, Rahim Yar Khan, DG Khan, and Bahawalpur (Punjab); Badin, Umerkot, Tharparker, Sukkur, and Mirpur Khas (Sindh); Jhal Magsi and Jaffarabad (Balochistan); Karak, Charsadda, Nowshera, and Kohistan (KP); as well as Gilgit and Ganchi (GB). This support included the distribution of food parcels and hot meals, ensuring a safe water supply, Multi-Purpose Cash Grants.

5. Health, Nutrition and safe water

A total of 44 mobile health centres were set up across severely flooded districts, including Mirpur Khas, Sukhar, Umerkot, Badin, Dadu, and Khairpur in Sindh; Jhal Magsi and Jafferabad in Balochistan; Charsadda, Nowshera, Swat, Karak, and Kohistan in KP; and Rajanpur, Rahim Yar Khan, DG Khan, and Bahawalpur in Punjab.

Additionally, medical camps were specifically organized for malnourished mothers and children in Rajanpur. These camps provided checkups, diagnostic tests, medicines, and food supplements to address deficiencies in protein, iron, calcium, vitamins, and other essential nutrients, thus preventing malnutrition from progressing to acute stages. These efforts benefited over 500 children under the age of five and 300 pregnant mothers, reducing the risks associated with insufficient nutrition during pregnancy.

Access to clean drinking water and the promotion of enhanced hygiene practices are vital aspects of healthcare services during emergencies. Supplying clean water to affected communities paired with awareness sessions and the utilization of Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials in local languages has been continued during the first three month of flood emergency. Furthermore, the initiative encompasses the distribution of herbal water purifiers and solar water treatment bags to improve water quality.

STORIES FROM THE FIELD

Meet Sakina, a 26-year-old woman from Dihari Bagh Khuiratta, who recently got married. She came to us with some troubling symptoms: lower abdominal pain, aching in her lower back, and unusual vaginal discharge that had been bothering her for a while. Despite being married for three years she was anxious because she hadn't been able to conceive.

Her menstrual cycles were regular, and on examination, she appeared thin and lean but otherwise healthy. There were no obvious issues during the examination of her abdomen or other systems. Initial tests and an ultrasound didn't reveal anything concerning either. Even her husband's tests came back normal.

After piecing together her symptoms and test results, we diagnosed her with pelvic inflammatory disease (PID), which can sometimes lead to infertility.

Our first step was to treat the PID with appropriate antibiotics. Once that was taken care of, we shifted our focus to her infertility. We sat down with Sakina and explained her condition, discussing possible treatments and starting her on supplements like folic acid and Evion 400mg daily for a month.

To our joy, on her next visit, Sakina shared the exciting news of a missed period and a positive pregnancy test! We scheduled an ultrasound for her, and to our amazement, it revealed not just one, but three separate amniotic sacs – she was pregnant with triplets!

Now, Sakina is in her first trimester, and she's been diligent about attending her regular antenatal check-ups at RAHMA Hospital in Khuiratta. We're thrilled to be a part of her journey and look forward to welcoming her little ones into the world.

Meet Zaheer Ahmed, a resilient 58-year-old who has been battling Type 2 diabetes for 15 years. When he arrived at RAHMA Hospital Khuiratta on January 5th, 2023, with a stubborn ulcer on his left foot, he feared the worst. But with determination and a solid treatment plan, his ulcer vanished within three weeks, leaving no scars behind. Living with Type 2 diabetes is like navigating a minefield of health complications, from the brain to the toes. Foot ulcers, like Zaheer's, are a common hazard, capable of spiraling into dangerous conditions like gangrene or septicemia if ignored. While some may try to tackle these wounds solo, Zaheer's case demanded a comprehensive approach to top-notch care.

Debridement: We cleared out the dead tissue from Zaheer's ulcer

Off-loading: With special gear like shoes or crutches, we eased the pressure on his foot, giving it room to mend.

Infection control: With the right antibiotics, we kept any nasty bugs from spreading.

Nutrition: We fine-tuned Zaheer's diet

Technical advances: Using cutting-edge methods, we managed moisture and kept the wound dry and clean.

Education and empowerment: Zaheer learned that his active involvement was key to his recovery.

His journey to full recovery underscores the power of teamwork and a holistic approach to healthcare. It's proof that with dedication and collaboration, even the toughest challenges can be conquered.

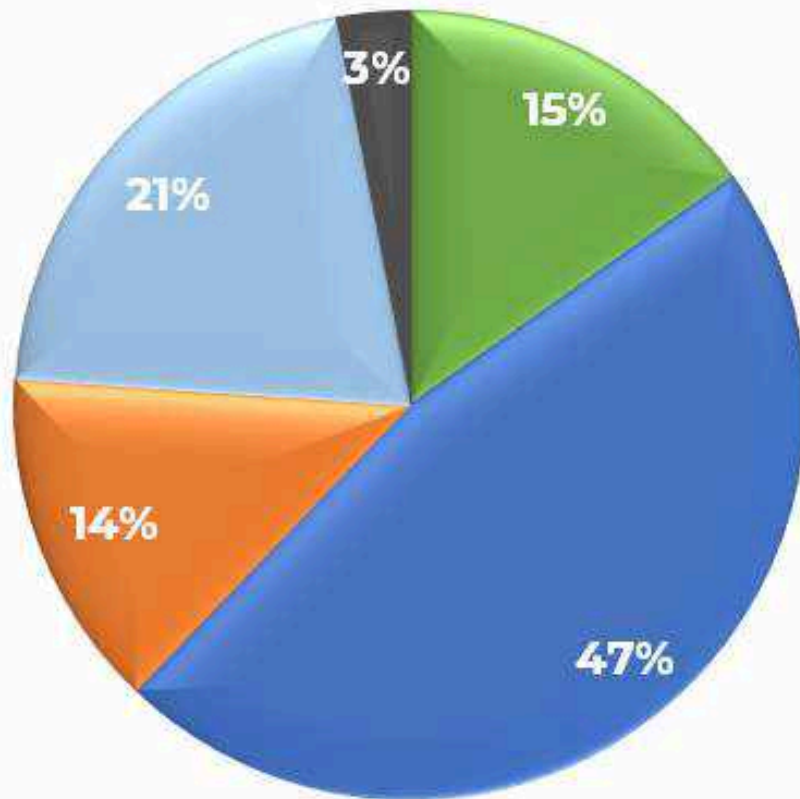

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT
TO THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of "RAHMA ISLAMIC RELIEF" which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2023, and related statement of income and expenditure, statement of changes in gross fixed and deferred capital assets for the year from ending and relating to the financial statements, including summary of significant accounting policies.

Basic Information
